DIRECTORS' NOTE, SUPERFEST 2023

Superfest has always been a place where disabled people's experiences do not have to be censored for nondisabled audiences, and this year's lineup particularly illustrates the power in disability-forward storytelling. The 2023 films couldn't be more unique. When we look at the 2023 line-up, the films couldn't be more unique, whether it's a man epically attempting to swat a mosquito or a groovy dance party at a social services office. Yet they all share a common theme – they explore intimate and vulnerable situations that disabled people must navigate in daily living. Mainstream media continues to oversimplify disability experiences, thinking audiences can't handle anything more. But Superfest's audience is proof that there is a market hungry for content that goes beneath surface-level themes. And we find these stories by centering the perspectives of the disabled community that are by the disabled community. 100% of our jury identify as disabled people. In addition, we are grateful that this year marks the return of a disabled person to the directorship (Shaina Ghuraya), who first connected with our festival in 2020 as a filmmaker and understands the impact Superfest has. Shaina was drawn to Superfest because it is a place where disabled experiences are expanded upon to show all our intersectional intricacies. With the ongoing writers' and actors' strikes in Hollywood,

the industry's shortcomings

are being re-examined, and

greater push to tear down the gatekeepers that keep stories like these out. This year's Superfest is a testament to the creativity that is ripe in our community. These films are bold, quirky, and unapologetic, but above all else, these are stories people have never seen on screen before. We can't wait to share them with you and learn what you think!

FESTIVAL ACCESS

Access updates at Superfest:

Each year we work to ensure high-quality audio descriptions for blind and low-vision Superfest attendees. We recognize that open audio description creates barriers for others with sensory-processing disabilities, while closed audio description can be frustrating for users navigating new platforms and apps. Following last year's successful collaboration with DiCapta Foundation to use their All4Access app for in-person screenings, we will continue utilizing their platform this year. For our virtual participants, audio descriptions can be toggled on with the click of a button for all films.

UK, 2022 (Experimental Short, 5 min.)`

A disabled mechanic takes us on a musical journey of 80s disco & ballroom after his local job center denies him access to work.

Me If I Were A Woman

France, 2022 (Dramatic Short, 27 min.)

Juliette, a 19-year-old with Down syndrome, is experiencing her first love, but her romance is quickly upended when Juliette is pressured by her mother and doctors to undergo sterilization surgery because of her disability. She has only a short time to make a decision and make her voice heard.

Whose Voice Is It Anyway Jury's Choice Award

UK, 2022 (Mockumentary Short, 5 min.)

A darkly funny mockumentary about two identically disabled forty-year-old women, Lottie and Charlie, who have athetoid cerebral palsy. Both celebrate their 40th birthday with family and friends—one is given the choice and the ability to communicate, and the other is not.

Invisible World

USA, 2023 (Experimental Short, 5 min.)

To apply for a disabled parking placard, a doctor within the state must approve the application. As part of the application, there are six medical conditions which qualify a person for a placard. Many people with disabilities are included in these categories, and many are not. This film is a record of the filmmaker's introduction to healthcare in the state of Utah. Her processing of the appointment and consequential aftermath as a video object serves as a reclamation and assertion for understanding disability and the physical world otherwise.

Chronic

Canada, 2022 (Dramatic Short, 9 min.)

Following a traumatic brain injury, a young woman's recovery is interrupted when her friends insist she come out for a birthday party. After reinjuring herself, she takes the first step in her new life by joining a chronic pain support group.

After their mother's death, a woman with a cognitive disability and her estranged sister must learn to communicate to move forward?

The Beauty of Being Deaf

USA, 2023 (Experimental Short, 3 min.)

Artist, director, and author Chella Man presents a meditation on Deaf identity and language—underwater.

Chella Man in conversation with Superfest co-director Shaina Ghuraya

Join us after Sunday's Superfest screenings at the Asian Art Museum for a panel and Q&A with filmmaker, actor, artist, and activist Chella Man, moderated by Superfest Co-Director Shaina Ghuraya.

Chella Man is a New York-based artist, director, and author whose work features the continuums of disability, race, gender, and sexuality, informed by his Deaf, trans, Jewish, and Chinese identities. Chella made his acting debut in the second season of DC's "Titans" as Jericho, a crime-fighter that uses sign language to communicate. Chella is also the filmmaker of Superfest 2023's "The Beauty of Being Deaf," an experimental short film that meditates on Deaf identity and language underwater.



EXCLUSIVELY ONLINE SCREENING





USA, 2022 (Feature, 86 min.)

This film uncovers in real-time, and with singular access, the devastation experienced by residents of a New York City nursing home during the coronavirus pandemic. Co-directors Alexis Neophytides and Andres "Jay" Molina take viewers inside Coler, on Roosevelt Island, where Jay lives with his fellow Reality Poets, a creative group of mostly gun violence survivors. Fire Through Dry Grass shows these disabled Black and brown artists refusing to be abused, confined, or erased.



Abi Palmer Invents the Weather (Light)

UK, 2023 (Documentary/Experimental Short, 10 min.)

A literal and abstract take on the spring season, Abi Palmer documents translating spring into a cat-accessible format for her indoor cats. The film's voiceover, written and narrated by Palmer, serves as a love letter to Palmer's cats and the climate, culminating in a playful meditation on disability, climate, and life that can't talk back. "Light" is the third film in the series "Abi Palmer invents the Weather," chronicling Palmer's year-long process of performing the outside world for her indoor cats.



We Care

UK, 2022 (Dramatic Short, 16 min.)

Annie is surprised to find that her new carer happens to be a man, a manly man, a very manly man. This beautiful and funny piece takes a dark turn with devastating consequences when Annie is let down by the system that is meant to take care of her.

Excitement is brewing in a social co-op for a group of disabled people as they debate the destination for their next trip. Tiziano, however, does not want to hear about democratic votes: he wants to go to Cinecittà World, a movie themed amusement park, to visit the old west. What will he invent when he discovers that the attraction is different from how he imagined it?
